### The Methodist Diaconal Order.

A mission-focused, pioneering religious community committed to enabling outreach, evangelism and service in God's world.

Did you know that within Methodism, we are all ministers? In fact all Christians are called through their baptism and hearing the word of God, to ministry and service to the whole people of God and the communities in which they live. It could be in helping at a food bank, sharing our faith with others, preaching, worship leading, helping someone in need, the list is actually endless. We are all ministers!

There is however, the ministry of the "Ordained", those who are called by God to a lifetime commitment to serve God. Within our tradition we have two forms of Ordained Ministers. The Presbyter and the Deacon, both known as ministers. For many, the role of Presbyter is more widely understood as every church will usually have a Presbyter whose primary calling is in the pastoral care and charge of a particular church.

In this short article I want to focus on the distinct ministry of the Deacon within the Methodist Church. Though Deacons undertake the same theological training as their Presbyteral colleagues, Deacons have a very distinct calling. Though Deacons often officiate at weddings, funerals and baptisms, and will preach on Sundays, their role is one of witness and service within the communities where a church may be based. Deacons are members of a religious order and live as a dispersed community under a rule of life. So what does this role look like for me, here in St Albans and Welwyn circuit? What does witness and service look like to those who may not attend church?

Cornerstone House in Hatfield is a great example of how Diaconal Ministry can work. As you may know, Cornerstone is based in the Salisbury Village estate in Hatfield. There is no church building and community facilities are few and far between. In the difficult times we find ourselves today, many are finding everyday life difficult. My role involves getting to know the local community and finding ways in which the church can be a light in the darkness. As I live alongside the community I am in a position to hear and see where there may be a need. As I, and my wife Jane, walk the streets we meet the people where they are at. We make friends and get to know them. It is in these forming relationships that we can find ways, not only to act, but to offer hope. Jesus said, "I have come so that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly" I cannot solve all the problems of the world, but when somebody who is elderly, is feeling isolated, I can offer a listening ear and a place of comfort to chat. When a family is struggling with their children we can give them a break by looking after the children for an hour after school. With the cost of heating rising, we can offer somewhere to come and be warm for a few hours. As these relationships grow stronger, new ways can be found to be witnesses of God's love and help them to live that abundant life. Telling people about Jesus over a cup of coffee can be very refreshing! I am often asked by people who don't profess a faith, "Why do you do, what you do?" It is in those conversations that I am given the opportunity to be a witness of God's love. It may not look like church, but at the heart, it is exactly that, it is building the kingdom of God from ground up.

Two points from our calling of the Methodist Church remind us that the church exists to be a good neighbour to people in need, and also to make more followers of Jesus Christ. So alongside the other points of Worship, and caring, the work of Deacons alongside the whole church is a vital part of all our ministries.

So for me, as your Deacon, you will most likely find me serving in ways that allow me to be a witness. In St Albans, that may be chatting with someone over coffee, serving the homeless a hot meal, or helping out with an activity at one of our churches.

In short, the kingdom of God is available to all: along the way, it feeds the hungry, clothes the poor, heals the sick, binds up the broken hearted, and builds a true community.

You may be interested to know that I am speaking at the next Thinking Lunch at Marlborough Road on the I<sup>st</sup> of December. I will be talking about how the Diaconal Order came into being and give some more insight into the role of Deacons across our connexion. Cornerstone House is also holding an open day on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> December between 10am and 3pm and I hope this will give an opportunity to see for yourself what Diaconal Ministry looks like in our area.





The Bishop said: "It has given me great pleasure to honour him in this way and I know that you will want to be amongst the first to offer him your congratulations.




Fr Rob will be installed as Canon at a special service in the Abbey on Saturday 26th November at 4pm and it is hoped that parishioners will join him for this service.

- Job Title: Part time Children & Families Worker for the Methodist Churches in St Albans
- **Location:** The role will be based at **Hatfield Road Methodist Church** but with time spent in both churches.
- **Employer:** Employed by Hatfield Road Methodist Church and under the supervision of the minister in pastoral charge of both Churches

Eco Church is a free, online, reward scheme designed to equip churches to work towards environmentally friendly practices. The awards take the form of bronze, silver or gold certificates and a questionnaire can be completed online to see if your

church qualifies for one of these certificates. The Methodist Church encourages the Eco church scheme- visit <u>Take action: become an Eco Church (methodist.org.uk)</u> for a short video on how to get started.

The **Methodist Church** has set an aspirational target of becoming a net zero carbon emissions church by 2030. To download a leaflet - 6 steps to net zero carbon emissions, - visit <u>Action for Hope</u> (methodist.org.uk).

**The Times** religious affairs correspondant reported recently that churches are hard pressed to try and achieve the target of being carbon neutral by 2030. 50% of churches polled said they did not have the funds to make the necessaary changes and this rose to 62% amoung anglican churches. This depite the CofE allocating £190m towards the objective and so they are still having to give churches permission to install gas and oil boilers.

## **Create & Celebrate at HRMC**

Since October 2021 HRMC have had a new style of All Age Worship on the first Sunday of each month called "Create & Celebrate". It is based on a successful format which had been run on fifth Sundays and other occasions such as Christingle.

Each month has a theme for the all age service which provides a focus for the activities. In the church hall between 10:00 and 11:00 there is a range of creative things to do including: crafts, card making, art (on large and small







scales), prayer writing and topics for discussion. There are also active play-based opportunities such as small world storytelling and Jenga. (A team meets each month with the preacher to discuss, plan and prepare the ideas.) Tea, coffee, squash and homemade cakes and biscuits are available. Some folk come to the 9:00 Communion service

and stay for the fellowship. Others arrive during the

creative time. At 11:00 everyone goes into the church for a 45 minute informal all age service. Things which have been created are taken into the church and included in the service. The format is proving very popular with more and more folk of all ages coming. As the pictures show, it is thoroughly enjoyed by all who attend.
