
A CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM REV DAVID JEBB

THE REVEREND PETER HUDSON

The congregation learnt from Rosemary that she first heard of Peter through her parents who lived in Watford and who were very fond of him. When Peter first retired to St Albans he used to preach a lot on the Watford Circuit plan and especially at her parents' church of Trinity Methodist Church, where Peter's preaching is remembered by members there as being thoughtful and stimulating. She said "For me personally Peter was an unfailingly supportive colleague and he and Celia soon became dear friends, and Peter's wisdom and graciousness became apparent to me very early on in my time at MRMC." She described his involvement in and support for many initiatives – the God in Love discussions, the Book Club, Bible Study sessions, Holiday at Home, Pastoral care, and All We Can. He enjoyed being the Free Church Chaplain at the Abbey, and was a key figure in developing the ecumenical link with St Peter's Anglican Church. Rosemary said, "Peter is remembered for his kindness, his graciousness and his wisdom. He was calm and patient. His opinions were always considered, and he had a very gentle approach."

Canon Margaret Tinsley of St Peter's also paid tribute to Peter, and the enthusiasm he brought to the ecumenical link, and being able to preside at Holy Communion. She finished her tribute by saying, "In the last few months, I've had the privilege of visiting Peter in his house and taking Holy Communion to him and Celia - a real honour, especially as they were so welcoming and grateful. Although he was bedridden, Peter's character shone out: always gracious, thankful, ready to partake in spite of his illness. It is a great joy that I have known and been able to share some aspects of ministry with Peter."





ECO CHRISTMAS TIPS FROM BEDS ESSEX AND HERTS METHODISTS

(This is a summary: go to www.wwf.org.uk and search 'Christmas' for more tips)

PRESENTS AND CARDS

Try to reduce your Christmas footprint: gift an experience which needs no packaging: ensure wood and paper gifts and Christmas cards are made from recycled materials where possible.

FOOD

Plan meals to reduce food waste: use Tupperware, foil or wax cloth covers rather than clingfilm to cover leftovers to eat later.

DECORATIONS

Use recyclable or reusable crackers, or make homemade ones with sustainable gifts: use LED lights on your Christmas tree, and recycle old decorations or make your own from waste paper.

THE TREE

If it's artificial, keep re-using it, or buy a real tree which is FSC-certified.

THE METHODIST RECORDER FEATURES ‘CORNERSTONE’

Nigel Perrott had an interesting article published in the Methodist Recorder recently, describing the work he and Cornerstone do in their community. He writes about the way the Manse is used for meetings and get-togethers, and about how he interacts with the community around them, and has built people's trust in him and the organisation. He goes on, “Now that trust has been built, we can focus on faith, and we hold a monthly ‘Faith Talk’. One of our regular attendees told us, ‘I don't do organised religion!', yet each month she comes along, and we talk about Jesus, faith and how this fits into our daily lives.”
